Over the years Robert, a Mennonite, quietly contributed his time to the church. He also gave thousands of dollars to help improve the quality of life in the area, including donating the land for Menno-Hof, the Amish Mennonite Visitor's Center. More recently the Auction donated \$300,000 to the town of Shipshewana for much needed improvements to its sewer system. Robert's sons, Kevin and Keith, will continue as owners of the Auction and its accompanying Flea Market in the traditions supported by their father. Robert Lambright made a dramatic impact on life in his community and he will be long remembered.

LANDENBERGER, Terry Dennis Landenberger

TUTTLE, ND — Terry Dennis Landenberger was born June 14, 1952, to Leonard and Doris (Merkel) Landenberger, in Tuttle. He attended the country school for first grade and continued at the Tuttle School through high school. As a farm kid he was expected to help out with all the chores he could, from cleaning the barn to milking. Once he finally got tall enough, Terry graduated up to driving tractors, where he happily spent the rest of his life. On Jan.18, 2017, he was found at the wheel of his favorite tractor, having suffered a fatal heart attack. He is preceded in death by his parents, Leonard and Doris (2009). Terry is survived by his brother Lane of Bismarck; his niece Lisa (Richard) Whiteing and their children James and Zoë of Luxembourg; his niece Sarah (AJ Chmielewski), Mandan; Lisa and Sarah's mother Cynthia of Bismarck; his brother Brian (Carolyn), Cartersville, GA; his niece Alexis (Trent) Woolbright, Cartersville, GA. Terry played basketball, as well as running track and cross country. He was either pretty good at it or there wasn't much competition, because he lettered all four years. After high school, Terry joined the Marines. He was deployed to Okinawa and worked on radar. He was honorably discharged in September 1973. After a brief stint at marriage, Terry remained a bachelor for the rest of his life. Although he had no children of his own, his three nieces, great-niece and nephew, and countless neighbor kids have many fond memories of crazy uncle Terry. Tractor rides, Looney Tunes, swapping cans of beans and wrapped potatoes for Christmas, turtle races... Terry was often a big kid himself. For many years he umpired women's slow-pitch softball, keeping track with a ball/strike counter his youngest brother ordered with Bazooka Joe wrappers. A popular umpire, tournaments were often organized around his schedule. He could also be counted on to have a hand in community projects, especially the town's store and annual Community Days. With his suspenders and trusty pliers, Terry was there. Mother Nature was possibly Terry's greatest love. For many years he trapped, not taking more than needed to keep populations in check. He could tell you where the ground owls were nesting, weather patterns, and exactly what the weather was this day 15 years ago. He had a keen eye and had found several Native American stone hammers while cultivating. He will be much missed. Sundays will be a bit emptier for everyone accustomed to his phone calls. The local area will be a lot quieter without his laugh. Hasn't been this quiet since 1952. Cremation has already taken place, and the funeral will be held in Tuttle later this spring.

LANGDELL, Joe Langdell

Joe Langdell was known for the World War II stories he could tell. He was well qualified, having watched from shore as his ship, the USS Arizona, sank during the Dec. 7, 1941, surprise attack on Pearl Harbor. The 100-year-old Langdell — Yuba-Sutter's last Pearl Harbor survivor and a fixture in Marysville's annual Veterans Day parade — died Wednesday, family members confirmed. He had an outgoing personality, as well as an affinity recounting the historic attack, and had been living at The Fountains care facility in Yuba City. "He talked to anybody about it," said John Langdell of Spearfish, SD, one of his two sons. "He relished being the center of attention. That was part of his makeup." Son Ted Langdell, who lives in Marysville, said his dad kept high spirits at The Fountains. "I guess you might say he was creating an endearing character over there," he said, adding a bit of mischief was likely involved. Joe Langdell's death came nearly four months after his 100th birthday. Ted Langdell was there holding his hand when he passed away. Riding in a wheelchair, Joe Langdell took part in November's annual Veterans Day Parade in downtown Marysville. His presence in the parade became a focal point for the yearly event. John Langdell said his father's remains will be interred at the site of the USS Arizona, the ship on which he served, next Dec. 7. A local public memorial service will likely be held in April, he said. Don Schrader, a local veterans advocate and a board member of the Museum of Forgotten Warriors in Yuba County, noted Langdell visited the museum from time to time. "He went to the parades and always wore his uniform," Schrader said. "It's the passing of an era. It is unfortunate, but we are losing those guys." Schrader also noted that Langdell seemed to take pleasure in letting people know about his wartime experiences. "I think he enjoyed it greatly, and I think he was very proud of it," Schrader said. "And he should have been." Langdell's passing leaves the Yuba-Sutter area with no surviving members of the Dec. 7, 1941, Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Fellow survivor Art Rodda, who lived in Sutter, died in 2013. "It certainly was the focal point of his service in the Navy and the attack on Pearl Harbor was the center of his life," John Langdell said of his father. "He took pride in it." The Appeal-Democrat has recounted Joe Langdell's story multiple times over the past several decades. As told to the A-D in 2009, he was 28 years old and asleep on Ford Island when the attack happened and watched helplessly from shore as the Arizona sank and 1,177 sailors assigned to it were lost. Retiring as a lieutenant commander, Joe Langdell was believed to be the last surviving officer assigned at that time to the Arizona. He was recently one of only seven survivors from the ship, John Langdell said. Joe Langdell told the Appeal-Democrat in 2009 that he likely would have been killed if he had been on board the Arizona when it was attacked. "Saw it sink? Hell, yes," he said in 2009. "I was right there on shore, as close as you could get while keeping out of the bomb range." Langdell helped other men wade to shore and get to the hospital, according to the A-D account. He said he was later asked to go with 15 other men who had sheets and pillowcases to gather all the bodies above the waterline. "You'll always remember it," Joe Langdell said at the time. "It's a milestone in your life — one of the most important battles in the world, in world history, and I've got my medals to tell about it." Born Oct. 12, 1914, in Wilton, NH, Joe Langdell was employed as a salesman after the war and, with his wife, sought out the warmer California climate — first in the Bay Area and later in the Yuba-Sutter area. He was a former owner of the Village Mart store in Yuba County. Arrangements are pending at Ullrey Memorial Chapel in Yuba City.

LANGDELL, Joseph Langdell

Joseph Langdell, a retired Navy Lieutenant Commander who was oldest survivor of the Japanese attack on the USS Arizona at Pearl Harbor, has passed away at the age of 100. According to the Associated Press, his son Ted stated that Langdell was living in a nursing home in Yuba City, CA at the time of his death. He is also the last survivor of the attack on his ship, which lost over 1,000 men during the Dec. 7, 1941 bombing. During the attack, Langdell had been inside a military base near the ship and when the attack occurred, he worked hard to attempt rescuing his shipmates and also help to remove the remains of those who died in the ship. "I felt absolutely helpless as I watched the attack," Langdell told the AP on the 56th anniversary of the attack. "If I had been aboard, I would have been killed in that No. 2 (gun) turret. That was the one that blew up. It was my luck to be assigned off the ship that day." Ted Langdell spoke of how his father did not discuss the attack and he went back to the site in 1976 for the first time. Joseph Langdell would later talk about his story, his son said, because, "It drew attention not just to him, but gave him the chance to tell stories." His ashes will be laid to rest at Hawaii's Memorial for the USS Arizona. The Arizona Republic reported that Langdell would always wear his USS Arizona caps. When his son asked why, Langdell would respond, "It acknowledges to people that I'm a survivor. The hat represents Arizona."

LEACH, Talon R. Leach

A Callaway County man was one of 16 who died when a military plane crashed Monday night July 10, 2017 in Mississippi. Talon R. Leach, age 27, was a sergeant with the U.S. Marine Corps 2nd Raider Battalion, according to a Marine Corps news release. Leach had received awards and recognition since he began serving in the Marines in 2010, including Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal and National Defense Service Medal. The flight left from Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, NC, and was transporting personnel and equipment to the Naval Air Field in El Centro, CA. There were 15 crew members and passengers and one Navy Corpsman on the plane when the KC-130T Hercules aircraft crashed in a field in Mississippi.

(broken heart) sending love to the other USMC families that lost loved ones last night." Lennon was stationed at Stewart and killed in a crash in Mississippi on July 10, 2017.

LEVINGSTON, Frank Levingston

Frank Levingston, the oldest verified World War II veteran in the United States passed away Tuesday at the age of 110. Levingston was also considered to be the oldest living man in the United States at the time of his death. Levingston enlisted in the U.S. Army on Oct. 6, 1942, according to the National Archives "He felt the obligation to give to the country whatever he possibly could, and he was very excited about it," Jee Levingston, Frank's nephew, told ABC News. "He gave it his very best." "He was the backbone of this family," Levingston said. "He never married, had no children, but he took great pride in taking care of his sister's and brother's children. He was an individual who was able to mingle with people of all levels, from the uneducated to those with the highest of level of education." Levingston was born in North Carolina. After the war, he became a cement finisher.

LINLEY, Brett Linley

Staff Sergeant Brett George Linley from 11 Explosive Ordnance Disposal Regiment, The Royal Logistic Corps, serving with the Counter-IED Task Force, died in Afghanistan Saturday 17 July 2010. Staff Sergeant Linley was 29 and from Birmingham. He and his team were working to clear Improvised Explosive Devices from a vital route in the Nahr-e Saraj District of Helmand Province when he was killed by an explosion. There is no doubt that during his tour of duty in Afghanistan, Staff Sergeant Linley's actions have saved many lives, both Afghan and British, and his death is a tragic loss to his unit, his family and his friends. Staff Sergeant Linley is survived by his partner and his parents. Spokesman for Task Force Helmand, Lieutenant Colonel James Carr-Smith, said: "He was a very brave and courageous man and he will be missed by us all. We will remember him." He enlisted into the Royal Logistics Corps in March 2001 and qualified as an Ammunition Technician in September 2002. Over the next eight years, Staff Sergeant Linley trained for several Counter-IED roles and most recently in March 2010, qualified as a High Threat IEDD Operator. Over this time he perfected his bomb disposal skills whilst deployed on three separate tours of duty in Northern Ireland, working closely with the Police Service of Northern Ireland. He also deployed in the Ammunition Technician role to the Falklands Islands and Canada. In late March 2010, Staff Sergeant Linley deployed with his IEDD team on Operation HERRICK to Afghanistan and conducted dozens of IED clearances across Helmand province.

LLOYD, Ruth Emmons Lloyd
